"Celebrating 75 Years"

Dear Old Threshers Friends and Family,

"Midwestern threshermen and steam engine fans made Pontiac their rendezvous as they converged on Chautauqua Park this morning to attend Dan S. Zehr's first Steam Engine and Threshermen's Reunion." That was the lead paragraph in Les Bell's front-page story in the Pontiac Daily Leader on September 14, 1949.

The original idea to form the Midwest Old Threshers Association came from a discussion between Clark Everts, W.E. (Ted) Detrick, Ray H. Ernst, and Herman E. Elgar in September, 1949. The four were returning from the Zehr Threshing Reunion in Pontiac, Illinois. Considering the many steam engines and separators in Henry County, Iowa, the men decided there was great potential to host a threshing reunion in Mt. Pleasant.

After several winter meetings, the election of a Board of Directors and lengthy discussions about a Mt. Pleasant event, the Association was chartered on August 21, 1950, and the first Reunion was held September 20 and 21. Records show that 15 steam engines and 8 separators were exhibited with an estimated 10,000 people

attending the first Reunion.

Now, fast forward 75 Years to Aug. 28th to Sept. 1, 2025, in the same location that it all started those two days in September 1950, McMillan Park, Mount Pleasant, Iowa. I wonder what the founding four might say today after seeing how the show has grown and changed over the last 75 Years. I hope that they would be amazed and happy with the last 75 years and ready for the next 75 years.

Yet, as I think about the last 75 years of Midwest Old Threshers, its not about the change in our agricultural heritage, it's not about the things now on display in the museums and during the show, it's not about the new buildings or other events and it's not about the ups and downs that the association has faced over the years.

For me, I think about the people who have made all happen over the years. The many generations of family's, volunteers, exhibitors, staff members, and Old Threshes board of directors that have given so much to keep the place alive. There has been over 100 different members of the Board of Directors, 3 administrators, many staff members, countless exhibitors, and a number too large to calculate of VOLUNTEERS. If it wasn't for all of these folks and their dedication to making Midwest Old Threshers the best it could be over the years, we wouldn't be here now Celebrating 75 years. THANK YOU, THANK YOU, to you all!

So, let me ask a favor of you this year! Which is to experience a part of the Reunion that you might not have done in the past. Make the time with the kids, with the grandkids, with the spouse and friends, old and new: enter that spelling bee in the North Village school, take a moment to set and rest in the shade of the Log Village, catch a show at the gazebo in Museum A, play a game of bingo, ride the carousel, ride the trolley, ride the train, or even go test your skills at drive a tractor. The list goes on of things that we all do that provide enjoyment for the visitors, but we all sometimes forget that we need to do those things as well.



Trolley 1779 is back on the rails

It's been awhile since 1779 has traveled "The Loop Line." Originating from Rio de Janeiro, the open-air trolley dates back to 1911. One of two streetcars of Naragansett design featuring a full-length upper side step making boarding much easier. Arriving in Mount Pleasant in 1970, 1779 has been in northeast lowa at the Gomaco Trolley Company undergoing a major restoration.

Volunteers from the Midwest Central Railroad recently helped

unload new trucks for the streetcar.

Midwest Electric Railway volunteers, along with Gomaco employees, have been running along the 2.5-mile circle testing the restored car.

Gomaco has also loaned a cutaway of a trolley perfect for photo opportunities during the Reunion.





Button Collectors' Update 2025

2025 Button Collector's Forum

Button collectors will meet for the 23rd Annual Button Collectors' forum in Colfax School at 9:30 on Sunday morning August 31,2025. Colfax School is located just south of Campground Hospitality and the Theater Museum. Mark your Old Threshers daily schedule.

2025 Souvenir Button Design

Ron (Pub) Melsha and his daughter Sarah Melsha are the owners of the 1922 30 hp Russell engine featured on the 2025 Souvenir Button. Their engine was manufactured by Russell & Company in Massillon, Ohio. Russell & Company reportedly started building steam traction engines in 1878 and produce over 18,000 farm, traction and stationary engines.

Pub purchased this engine in 2020 from August Olson at an auction in Robinson, North Dokata. Unfortunately, many of the people who knew the history of the engine have passed so the Melsha's are still researching its pedigree. However, Sarah believes that this is one of only seven model 30-90 Russell engines left in existence.

As luck would have it, four days after getting the Russell home the August 10, 2020 derecho struck Cedar Rapids with straight-line winds estimated to be as high as 140 mph. The derecho collapsed the building where the engine was stored. Pub and Sarah spent the next year re-restoring the engine for its debut at the 2021 OT Reunion. They are still working on restoring the original paint work. Sarah thinks the paint on the lower part of the engine is original and the upper part needs to be repainted to match. They are also trying to figure out why the underside of the boiler was never painted.

The Melsha's Russell was built with a universal boiler so it is capable of burning a variety of fuels (e.g., wood, straw, etc.).

That makes it an even rarer model. Perhaps only three or four of the existing 30-90 engines were built with a universal boiler.

2025 Button Design Artist

Again this year, Steven Paul Mendenhall is the artistic designer of the 2025 Old Thresher's button. Steve has been involved in many Old Threshers areas and programs since 1985. This is Steve's fifth year as the button's major designer, designing both the engine portrait and the button layout.

Steve's initials appear under the boiler on the 2025 button, but you might need a magnifying glass, or maybe the giant Souvenir button to find it!

2025 Button Construction

The 56 mm diameter button is constructed as many previous buttons have been—a plastic coated paper formed over a metal shell and held together by a silver-colored metal



backing disk. The attached silver-colored pin has the loop style catch.

Button Varieties

As of late May 2025, no new varieties of past years buttons have been reported.

Our collector's group's sharp-eyed variety collectors keep me up to date on new varieties for the current and past years. So far, no varieties of the 2025 button have been discovered, but major or minor varieties **Coaxinued.prc page 5**0 the reunion date, or during the reunion.

2025 Engine of the Year Special Souvenir Button

Due to the continuing popularity of the giant four-inch buttons, Old Threshers has issued a limited quantity of the 2025 Souvenir button in the large format. This sixteenth "giant button" makes an interesting supplemental button for the core collection. It also allows one to view the artwork in greater detail. These giant buttons have limited availability from the Old Threshers Gift Shop and souvenir stands while supplies last.

complete) their 10-hour volunteer commitment to Old Threshers prior to the opening of the reunion. The 2026 "volunteer year" begins at the end of the 2025 Reunion. Old Threshers is always looking for volunteers to help prepare for and put away after the Reunion.

The 2025 Exhibitor/Staff button is an oval name-window button. An attached, coordinating ribbon will identify the main Old Threshers activity area of the wearer.

Both the 10-hour Volunteer Button and the E/S Button and Ribbon are

earned for volunteer work at Old Threshers, and tend to remain in the collections of the individuals who earned them. Old Threshers has never sold either of these buttons. These supplemental buttons do, on occasion, show up in the secondary market; but collectors must hunt diligently for them. If you are interested in earning either or both of these volunteer buttons, contact the Old Threshers Office, the first step in becoming involved in Old Threshers rewarding volunteer service.

Official Supplements

The 10-hour Volunteer button for 2025 is a significant departure from past year's Volunteer buttons. Traditionally the volunteer button had a name window. According to Terry McWilliams, buttons with a name window have



limited availability and are significantly more expensive than in past years. Like the main Souvenir button, the Volunteer button is a 56 mm diameter button with a plastic coated paper formed over a metal shell and held together by a silver-colored metal backing disk. The Volunteer button coordinates with the colors of the main Souvenir button (red, yellow, white, and black).

Instead of printing the volunteer's name on a paper inserted in the name window, the name will be printed on a clear adhesive label that will be affixed over the white rectangle on the face of the button.

The 10-hour Volunteer button is given by Old Threshers to those individuals who have completed (or will




A Book Review from the shelves of the Midwest Old Threshers' Library

While these are not the only books about Old Threshers, they do mark two important milestones along the way. Both books are full of history and color photos of past reunions.

While some things seem comfortingly the same, others have faded away or given way to newer and better ways of doing things. At any rate, both folks who have been there for those years gone by, and folks newer to the show will enjoy taking a look back. (both books on shelf 3)

Truck brought back to life after 40 years in a barn

Tim and Lisa Ockenfels responded to a listing on Craig's List for a 1931 Ford Model A truck. The antique was all the way on the East Coast and had been in a barn for more than 40 years.

"We bought it site unseen," said Tim. "It hadn't been started in over four decades." The only thing using it were mice. A look inside the door panels found years of mice carcasses and acorns stacked 3/4 of the way up the door. The small nuts also found their way into the engine compartment and transmission.

They had the truck brought back to Mount Pleasant with the intention of a full restoration with the help of friend, Paul Maher. Plans were derailed when Tim was diagnosed with Stage 3 colon cancer in 2014. The restoration then fell to Mike Paine of Paine's Auto Body. Tim spent the better part of a year researching and finding parts for the truck, a welcome distraction from his cancer treatment.

Once the metal and mechanical work was done, Lisa started restoring the woodwork and doing other things Tim couldn't.

Ford made 8,282 Model A trucks in 1931. At a cost of \$455. The red of their truck is one of 38 colors offered that year.

The streets of Mt. Union, Iowa were lined with silver recently as the Richers family fired up their collection of Silver King tractors and paraded through the hamlet of 111.

Featuring odd balls and lesser-known tractors, this year's

featured Silver King owes its restoration to Janice Richers' father. Restored in the early 1980s, the tractor has been in the family ever since.

Roger Richers' father-in-law was responsible for getting Roger and the entire family interested in tractors and the restoration process as well as Old Threshers.

Roger and his son, Jacob, tag team tractor maintenance working hard to keep the fleet running.

The Richers' exhibit 12 tractors every year including six Silver Kings and five Fergusons. Their collection is made up of one of every Ferguson model made. Janice's father was a Ferguson salesman. They were able to find and purchase the very first and last tractor he sold at the dealership. It is the family's dream to own one of each of the Silver Kings manufactured. As they say, dreams do come true.

Roger said he and Janice were ecstatic to be approached by Tractorland director Alan Buckert last year with the news that their Silver King was to be featured. The entire family is honored to be chosen. Family members, including Janice's sister, will bring tractors from as far away as Wisconsin and Ohio. Roger said there will be 12-15 on display.

The Veenstra family's 1923 Husdon Essex is truly a family car. "Old Blue" once belonged to Suzy's great aunt and has never left the family.

When her great aunt died at the age of 102, the car was passed down to a cousin in Wisconsin who then passed it down to another cousin in Keota, Iowa. At that point the car was put

in storage and not used. When the family needed more space, they contacted Dennis and Suzy to see if they were interested in the antique car. Indeed, they were.

Previously restored in the 1960s, the Veenstras only needed to focus on the mechanicals of the car. It was not running when they got it in 2023. They took all the systems apart and cleaned everything. It was reassembled and exhibited for the first time at the 2023 Old Threshers Reunion.

The Veenstra's children are very active with exhibiting the car and very excited to be the featured this year. Parading is their favorite part of the Reunion. Ironically, the featured car is always on the turntable in the Antique Car Barn and cannot be paraded.

That doesn't mean there is nothing to drive, however. The Veenstras also exhibit Suzy's father's orange Model T Racer. After her father died, members of the Southeast Iowa Antique Car Club gathered around Suzy and taught her how to drive it. She is forever grateful for their kindness.

You will find the Veenstra family spread out between both floors of the Carn Barn as the featured car is front and center on the first floor, while the Model T is in the basement. Be sure to go find both cars and talk to the family.

"It's neat to see the different generations come through," said Suzy. "Watching the older generations explaining the differences and similarities of antique and modern automobiles is wonderful!"

It's no coincidence that Eddie Ward collects Wards tractors, after all, they share a name.

A few years ago, Eddie spotted a 1963 Montgomery Wards Squire 6 at a show near his home in Belton, Missouri. After some negotiations, he was able to trade another garden tractor for the rare find. It is believed to be only one of five remaining garden tractors of this make and model.

Being this year's featured in the garden tractors, Eddie is looking forward to bringing his collection to Mount Pleasant. He has all the Wards garden tractors manufactured from 1959 -1969. "I am anxious to get them all lined up," said Eddie. "I've never seen it."

Along with the tractors, Eddie also has attachments to display as well as a Wards push behind mower that has never been assembled.

The Squire 6 isn't his only rare tractor. Eddie will also be exhibiting an AC U Orchard tractor. This one of one tractor features a Continental engine and was once a part of the family 40 years ago before being sold to Larry and Nancy Holmes. Eddie is glad to have it back in the family. This tractor remains on display in the Richard E. Oetken Heritage Museums when it's not out on the grounds for the Reunion.

You will also see Eddie's Wards Twin Row, a full-size row crop tractor built by Montgomery Ward between 1941-1942.

Eddies garden tractors are kept at his mother's house not far from Mount Pleasant. He estimates that it will take 3-4 trips to get everything to the grounds.

Percheron draft horses have rich European history

This year's featured horse breed is the Percheron.

Used extensively in Europe during World War I, this French breed of draft horse is known for its well-defined muscles, being strong, smart, and most importantly willing to work.

Commonly bred for draft work, Percherons could be found pulling stagecoaches and eventually being used for agriculture and hauling heavy goods.

OT horse exhibitor Brandon Harp can attest to the intelligence of the breed. He has been raising Percherons for several years first exhibiting at OT in 2008. "We started using our horses on the sawmill," said Brandon. "Then someone brought a buckrake, but no one knew how to use it." Challenge accepted.

Brandon and his sure-footed team of horses worked together to figure it out. The buckrake, also known as a bull rake or hay sweep, has been part of the horse demonstrations ever since.

Brandon and his wife, DeAnn, have a special connection to Old Threshers as they were engaged behind a team of horses during a Reunion and celebrated their 10-year anniversary on August 1.

You can find the Harps traveling the Midwest with Josh Winkler and his family as they compete in Farm Team Challenges. Showcasing the strength and agility of these massive animals and the expertise of their handlers, these fast -paced competitions are timed events that require skill and coordination all around.

The Winklers are from Corning, Iowa. Josh credits his grandfather, John Unternahrer, for getting him involved with Threshers in 1994. John supplied the demonstration area with ear corn for 40 years.

As soon as he was big enough to drive a team of horses, Josh was helping his grandfather. As they say, the apple

doesn't fall far from the tree. Josh and Jasmine's boys - Jamison, 7, and Jakob, 4, - can both drive a team. Averaging about 1,800 pounds each, these massive, beautiful horses are just one of many breeds visitors to the Old Threshers Reunion can see in the Horse Barn.

Brandon will have six full-grown Percherons there as well as 2 babies. The young ones learn best when they are working side-by-side with the older horses. Josh will be exhibiting a team of three-year-olds.

Featured Gas Engine Field Brundage Co. of Jackson, Michigan

Midwest Old Threshers is celebrating its 75 years in 2025. In 1980, the show began to feature a specific gas engine manufacturer, and encourage exhibitors to dust off examples from their collections and bring them to show. 2025 will mark the 45th feature gas engine, which will be those built by the Field Brundage Co. of Jackson, MI, as well as the Sattley engines of Montgomery Ward built in the Field factories.

The Field Brundage Company had an interesting history, being created in 1905. It was previously known as Jackson Engine & Motor Co., which was itself created in 1904 through the combination of Trask-Field Gas Engine Co. of Jackson and the Albion Engine & Motor Co. of Albion. Both legs of the company traced their engine building starts back into the 1890s. Field Brundage built quality, commercial grade engines, that were quite heavy for their rated horsepower.

Competition in the 1910s forced Field Brundage to look for engine designs that could be made at lower cost. They introduced a pushrod engine in 1913 (to become known as the Type W), that would be part of their lineup for the next dozen years. The company sold out to Montgomery Ward in late 1916, who used the factory to make engines to sell in their big mail order catalogs. Montgomery Ward marketed the engines as the Sattley brand, and many thousands were sold. Engine



production ended by 1925, and the factory in Jackson was sold to Ampco Twist Drill & Tool Co. Old Threshers gives additional recognition each year to a featured

gas engine exhibitor, along with his engine. Brian Bambrook of Eddyville, IA is featured for 2025, with his 1-1/2 HP Field Type W engine. Brian has been in the gas engine hobby for 40+ years, and has been an exhibitor at Old Threshers for many of those years. His wife's grandfather was an engine collector, which sparked his interest and got him started collecting too. He has really enjoyed

the friendships and adventures thru the years the hobby has brought.

Brian found his Field engine on a trip to visit a long-time collector in North Dakota. The engine has much of its original paint and is in good mechanical condition. The engine started right up and ran good. Brian added the trucks to make it easier to bring to shows. The engine is stenciled "P&O", as it was sold thru the agency of Parlin & Orendorff. Based on its serial number, the engine was built early in 1915.

Old Threshers is looking forward to a great show with many examples of the featured Field Brundage engines on display. Be sure to be there and check it out!



The Midwest Central Railroad Shop has been a flurry of activity getting everything ready for the start of our operating season.

In the middle of July, five people from the Durango & Silverton Shops (pictured below) came for over a week to finish up the boiler repairs that were started prior to the last Reunion. They final fitted the side sheet and the door sheet and welded them into

place. New staybolts and rivets were installed. Since they

have left, the Shay has successfully passed a hydro test. A team has now started working on getting the firebrick in place so the locomotive can eventually be test fired. There are still some odds and ends to button up before she is ready to be steamed up. Crews are working hard to have her ready for the upcoming Reunion.

No. 6 is being prepared for her annual inspection. Part of her preparation is having the waste cellars gone through and filled with new material. This job is notoriously one the most dirty jobs at the railroad, and is now a right of passage of sorts for the

younger volunteers. The goal is to have her hydro tested and steamed up a bit before show for testing purposes.





Coach 303 is coming along quickly now as we near the end. A team has now put all of the brake rigging in place, and the car has successfully passed air tests. Work continues on the exterior and interior trim. New windows are being made for the coach. The interior of the coach will be similar to the new interior the Mignon car debuted at last year's Reunion.

Speaking of cars, be sure to keep your eyes out during the show for a special freight section that might make an appearance with a flatcar celebrating the 75th year of Midwest Old Threshers.



The Model T speeder will be celebrating its 100th birthday this year! We purchased it from Argent, but we believe it came from SS&S originally. We are bringing it back its original color, silver!

Young Guns in Preservation: Kendall Osier

The 24-year-old holds multiple positions at the Midwest Central Railroad while serving as co-founder and president of the Midwest Narrow Gauge Preservation Society

Editor's Note: The "Young Guns in Preservation" series is a recurring feature on the Trains.com website that profiles young individuals who are actively involved in rail preservation efforts. These articles highlight the work, dedication, and challenges faced by younger generations in keeping the history of railroading alive. The series also aims to showcase the diversity of skills and experiences within the preservation community. Kendall is the second one of the MCRR volunteers to have been featured. Even though the stories highlight their roles in railroad preservation, their dedication flows over into their volunteer efforts during the Old Threshers Reunion and sharing their passion with visitors. Like his father, the Midwest Central Railroad became a siren for Kendall Osier, who now serves multiple mechanical and operating positions at the 3-foot gauge railroad in Mount Pleasant, Iowa.

Alongside his wife, Lauren, the 24-year-old is also the co-founder and president of the Midwest Narrow Gauge Preservation Society, a fledgling non-profit whose mission is to preserve the underappreciated history of Midwest narrow gauge railroading through recently saved freight and passenger equipment.

How did you get involved in rail preservation?

Kendall Osier: I've been around narrow gauge railroads my whole life. My father was involved with Midwest Central Railroad well before I was born. The first time I was at the railroad was for the Midwest Old Threshers Reunion. I was just a couple of weeks old. The first thing that I helped with at MCRR was disassembling 2-6-0 No. 6 for some boiler work, and that was when I was about eight. It all just snowballed from there.

Now regarding the Midwest Narrow Gauge Preservation Society, it's almost hard to explain the founding because a lot of different things came together at the same time. My wife found a couple of 1882-built Fort Madison & North-Western boxcars at an abandoned farm in southeast lowa. It was quite the historical find, and the cars were in really good condition. We quickly worked on acquiring them, moving them off the farm, and stabilizing them. It kind of led toward the research on the other narrowgauged lines in Iowa. Due to the historical

significance of that, we just kept finding more and more pieces of equipment.

As a young preservationist, what have you found to be the most challenging aspects in the industry?

Kendall Osier: Starting a nonprofit from scratch, like the MNGPS, has certainly been challenging. The process requires figuring out various steps, from obtaining 501(c)(3) status to making a clear mission statement and specific goals for the organization.

Volunteer work for both the society and Midwest Central personally adds layers of complexity. I have a 40-hour-aweek job, 5 days a week, which is a juggling act. There are some weeks that I put 30-40 hours of preservation work on top of that. Other weeks, I can't fit as many hours as I'd like, but that's the reality of time management.

What's been the most rewarding for you so far?

Kendall Osier: The most rewarding thing for me is the people. Some of my lifetime friends I met through MCRR and MNGPS. Obviously, I met my wife at the former, and that's very near and dear to me. On the flip side of that, it's learning more about the people before us who started the railroads, bought the equipment, and initially ran it.

Where do you see rail preservation as it is today and what do you hope it'll become for the future?

Kendall Osier: I view it as prospering. I talked to quite a few contractors, and every one of them out there is just packed to the brim. There are several that are



booked in advance, so it's really hard to get a project scheduled anywhere. That goes to show that if there's a market there, there's an interest.

As far as the future is concerned, the interest will still be there, but I still see an issue with volunteer turnout. That's where I feel that the preservation aspect is integral to an organization's success. While I know that operations and special events are needed, as that's what brings in most of the money, it's not always what brings in most of the interest. Having that historical relevance is important to me, and I think there are a lot of organizations that do that well, but there are some that need to improve on that.

What advice would you give for any young person looking to get involved in the industry?




